

### **ON REFLECTION**

Facebook fan. But a few weeks ago, I happened to be scrolling through Facebook in the wee small hours of the morning, because jet-lag still hadn't worn off from our trip to see the family in California – and I came across two postings that really resonated with me, on topics that I've found troubling my mind recently: the election of Donald Trump as US President, and some post-


referendum attitudes in our country towards anyone who doesn't look or sound English.

If you're a regular Facebook user, you may well have seen the postings I'm talking about. But just in case you haven't, let me tell you about them.

The first was a 2 minute clip by an American TV sportscaster, Ernie Johnson, who described his feelings at being faced with a Presidential election choice of Hillary Clinton or Donald Trump: "I felt I'd been dealt a bad hand," he says. "There were trust issues with Hillary Clinton I couldn't get past...and some inflammatory rhetoric from Donald Trump that was incomprehensible and indefensible." He felt that he couldn't vote for either candidate and instead wrote in the name of a man he admired, knowing the man wouldn't be elected, but with a clear conscience at not having settled for voting for someone he couldn't actually support.

But then, he watched the first meeting between President Obama and President-Elect Trump, and, he says, "I was hopeful and I was encouraged, that there would be a difference between the President Trump and the Campaigning Trump... We have to give him a chance. But I hope that he's 'all in', in fixing the wounds and the divides that separate this country. But for me to be part of that, I have to look in the mirror and ask myself, 'How am I going to be a better man? How am I going to be a better neighbour? How am I going to be a better citizen, a better American?'"

Ernie Johnson goes on to say that he knows that as a broadcaster, he's not supposed to speak about politics or religion, but since he's already done the political bit, he might as well go in the "R" direction, too. "From one election to the next, I never know who is going to be in the Oval Office. But I always know who's on the Throne: I'm on this earth because God created me, and that's who I answer to. I'm a Christian; I follow this guy named Jesus – you might have heard of Him. And the greatest commandment He gave me was to love others. And Scripture also tells us to pray for our leaders. So that's what I'm going to do. I'm going to pray for Donald Trump. I'm going to pray for all those people who feel like

they're on the outside, looking in, who are afraid... In short, I'm praying for America. I'm praying that one day we're going to look back and say, 'You know what? That Donald Trump presidency – it was all right.' I'm praying."

The second posting I saw was by a friend of mine from Bristol. He shared a video put out by *Stop Funding Hate*. It shows a series of clips taken from previous Christmas adverts by the big stores – John Lewis, M&S and so on: the touching scenes about the family whose house burnt down, but whose Christmas was rescued by all the neighbours coming to share their goodies; the WW1 soldiers from both sides meeting to play football

in No Man's Land; the Man in the Moon making eye contact with the child in the bedroom window, and so on.

But, it says, "This is not a Christmas ad... Every year there is a beautiful story with a message about looking out for others, even if they are distant strangers... even if we've been told they're our enemy... But once the tinsel has been taken down everything changes... and the millions of pounds we spend at Christmas at John Lewis, Waitrose, Sainsburys, and M&S is used to buy adverts in papers with another message... that some of us are different... that some of us are a problem or a threat. The money we spend on gifts is used to stir hostility..." And we see the banner newspaper headlines, "BRITAIN MUST BAN MIGRANTS", "1 IN 5 MUSLIMS' SYMPATHY FOR JIHADIS", "KICK OUT FOREIGN CROOKS". Instead, it says, "2017 could be different. So this year, we'd like every brand to not only tell us a story but ask a question: What if goodwill to all wasn't only meant for Christmas?"

On Remembrance Sunday, we reminded ourselves of Jesus' words: "Love one another as I have loved you." Who'd have thought that it would be Facebook which would give me such great examples of how to put His words into practice this Christmas and into 2017?

### London to Venice on a bicycle

erry Adams works in international relief and development, and is a church warden at St James's church, Bramley. His wife Angela is an adviser at Citizens Advice and a governor at Bramley Church of England Primary School. They recently returned from a cycle ride to Venice and I asked Angela about their trip. This is what she told me:

# Q: From London to Venice – that sounds like a long way to cycle! What was the distance?

A: The total distance was about 1200 miles, which meant cycling an average of 75 miles a day for 16 days. We also had to cross the Alps, climbing some 26,000 feet (almost the height of Everest) in four days - which was a huge challenge!

# Q: What gave you the idea of this ride and what did your friends and family think about it?

A: I wanted to undertake some kind of challenge to celebrate my 60th birthday and this was a longer ride than Jerry and I had attempted before, so we decided this was the challenge for us this year! We also used our ride to raise funds for Shooting Star Chase Children's Hospices, and our friends and family (who mostly thought we were mad to undertake such a ride) were really supportive. To date we have raised nearly £2500 for these wonderful hospices through sponsorship for this ride.

### Q: Have you always been a cyclist?

A: Far from it! For most of my adult life I didn't do any kind of sport – I

seemed to be too busy juggling a full-time career and family commitments. But once our three children had all left home, in 2010 I decided (to my family's amazement!) I'd like to cycle from Land's End to John O'Groats, so I bought a bike and began to learn how to ride it. Since then we've cycled from Bordeaux to Barcelona and Calais to Carcassonne as well as the length of Britain twice. I just love cycling now, it's given me a new lease of life and it's a wonderful way to see the countryside.

# Q: So where did you start this ride and which countries did you go through?

A: We started at Bramley Bakery, where we enjoyed coffee and delicious cakes before catching the train to London. Coffee and cakes are a very important element of all cycle rides!

Then we set off on our bikes from the London Eye, heading for Lewes (our first overnight stop), the ferry from Newhaven to Dieppe, and then on to Paris. The ride took us through France, Germany, Switzerland, Austria, Lichtenstein and finally into Italy.

### Q: What were the best and worst parts of the trip?

Although the climbing was tough, the best part of the trip was undoubtedly the experience of crossing the Alps. The scenery is just awesome and we were blessed with fine weather too – although we did have to negotiate snow on the road in a few places!

The worst moment for me was when I fell off my bike and broke my arm. This meant I had to give up on cycling the full distance but I was lucky enough to be able to travel in the luggage van supporting our trip. Jerry cycled all the way to Venice though!

### Q: So where do you plan to go next?

A: We love cycling around Hampshire and we have no plans to ride further afield for now. But who knows what opportunities 2017 will bring. Another year, another ride?

### News from the nursery

This month Butter Daisy Nursery have been exploring the topic of 'Light and Dark' and we have been investigating different light sources and what causes darkness. Pre-School compared daytime and nighttime, sunshine and blue sky, starry nights and shadows.



The children took some transparent coloured shapes under our wooden loft and then shone a torch through to create different colours. We made shadow puppets and were fascinated as we watched the different shadowy shapes appear on the Nursery walls, floor and ceiling. Our Babies and Toddlers used light and dark fabric to build dens which they crawled inside to explore. Our colouring activity led to a discussion about which pictures needed 'dark' colours and which needed 'light' and the children then made a collage where they used various materials to create suns, moons and stars.

The children also enjoyed celebrating Diwali by reading the story of Rama and Sita then making Diwali cards with a handprint elephant design. There was lots of fun and mess as the children made salt dough lamps called Diyas which we decorated with beautiful, brightly coloured paints and lots of glitter to represent the oil lamps that guided Rama and Sita home.



Halloween has been another big theme this month and it really caught the imagination of our little ghosties and ghouls as they took part in activities surrounding this topic. The children carved pumpkins and used the inside of the pumpkin for sensory messy play! They also had fun with Halloween balloons, throwing them up high and trying to catch them as they floated back down. Everyone dressed up and looked 'spooktacular' in their costumes and enjoyed a ghoulish menu

This month I am delighted that two children from Year 6 have written about their recent experience of studying the Michael Morpurgo classic 'War Horse'. I hope you enjoy reading it.....

This term, year 6 have really enjoyed their topic based on War Horse by Michael Morpurgo. The War Horse story follows the life and events of Joey, a stunning and strong horse, who finds himself on both British and German sides during World War One. Year 6 used their artistic talents to create wonderful winter collages of Joey, which are displayed in the school hall and classroom. They have participated in a number of activities; one of their favourites was watching the movie and comparing it to the book then analysing the features of each and the reasons for the differences. They also had great fun creating freeze frames to represent one of the scenes in the book and presenting it to the class. Some of the other activities they enjoyed were: summarising a chapter, writing a diary entry from a character's point of view, writing a letter to a character in the book from another character in the book, writing a character description and many more. They have gained a greater understanding of what life was like for the horses during World War One and also the journeys taken by the soldiers (British and German) and their families. But without a doubt their favourite project of the year so far was creating an incredible tapestry depicting all the chapters in War Horse, using the technique of talking textile through sewing.

### Bramley Resident attends visit by Russian Patriarch Kirill in London

A Primatial visit of His Holiness Patriarch Kirill of Moscow and All Russia to the Diocese of Sourozh took place on Sunday 16th October 2016. The Patriarch is the Head of the Russian Orthodox Church in the world – and has no equivalency in the Catholic or Anglican faiths, however could be considered to be between a Cardinal and the Pope in terms of rank. The visit marked 300 years of the presence of the Russian Orthodox Church in Great Britain. The opening in 1716 of a parish of the Russian Church associated with the Russian Embassy was the starting point for the development of Russian Orthodoxy in England. Beginning from the small embassy church the Russian Church spread over the whole of Great Britain and Ireland. The parishes in both countries are united in the Diocese of Sourozh, which was founded in 1962.

The main event of the Primatial visit was the consecration of the Cathedral of the Dormition of the Mother of God in London following a major refurbishment. The work, which has been carried out in preparation for the anniversary celebrations, had included internal reordering, the construction of a new iconostasis, painting of new icons and the installation of a new set of bells. I was overjoyed to be invited to this event and felt blessed to be able to attend the service in the church on such a special day.

Some key excerpts from his speech are below.

"Your eminences, your graces, your eminence Archbishop Elisey, your grace the Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby. Your Royal Highness Prince Michael of Kent, distinguished representatives of the Catholic Church and the Armenian Church and the Coptic Orthodox Church, fathers, and brothers and sisters. I congratulate wholeheartedly all of you on the historic occasion that has happened today in the life of the Russian Orthodox Church on the British Isles. We are celebrating the 300-year anniversary of the presence of Russian Orthodox believers in the British Isles."

He went on to conclude.

"God save the Queen! God save the United Kingdom! God save Russia! And praise be to God in our hearts and our bodies."

There had been much press speculation in the run up to the visit due to the perceived support that Patriarch Kirill had given to President Putin, however, his message was one of peace and understanding in the world and the bringing together of the peoples of Great Britain and Russia through prayer.




### **Autumn at Little Apples**





### From your Borough Councillor

It is with great pleasure that I am writing my first article in the Bramley magazine as your elected Borough Councillor for Bramley and Sherfield on Loddon. I have been in and around Bramley with my business being located in Minchens Lane for some 20 years and have been a resident in Sherfield on Loddon for over 11 years. I know the pain of the Level Crossing and the narrow lanes in trying to avoid the barriers, so I thought this might be a good opportunity to share some information.

### On the right tracks?

I did take a little road trip around the "lanes" with one of the Senior BDBC officers at the end of October and luckily the Barrier was down every time we emerged on to the main road. "Flabbergasted" was



one of the reactions with an incredulous view on how on earth could the village use all the assets, pub, shop, bakery, school, playing fields and village hall if they were divided!

Following on from that at the beginning of November there was a meeting held at Hampshire County Council with regard to the Bramley Level Crossing.....the meeting yielded the following comments/points;

Clarification that Network Rail do not intend to close the crossing, but that they have been doing so elsewhere in the country, particularly rural public rights of way (rather than road crossing points)

You might be interested to know that Network Rail estimated that the crossing is down for around four minutes per train movement, and there are 199 trains passing through per day resulting in the Barriers down for 8 to 9 hours per day

The Bramley Level Crossing is ranked 21st out of 49 highest safety risk in the 'Wessex' area in terms of CCTV controlling crossings and the Barriers are manually operated by signallers controlling the route – who need to balance train reliability / punctuality, safety of all crossing users, and delays to motorists / pedestrians.

It is acknowledged that the rail traffic (freight included) will continue to increase in the medium to long-term, with consequential impacts on barrier down time - improvements to the A33 would assist in providing capacity /reducing congestion – which may help to reduce use of rural lanes as an alternative (Bramley PC work indicated that around 53% of vehicle using the crossing is through traffic).

### The bigger picture

So looking at the "bigger picture" for Bramley this brings me to the fact that Bramley Parish Council and Neighbourhood Planning Group has worked very hard in bringing forward a Neighbourhood Plan. The Bramley Neighbourhood Plan (NP) is only the 3rd neighbourhood plan in the borough to reach this stage and it has been reviewed by both the Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council Planning officers and the Independent Examiner and it will be coming forward for a "referendum".

The referendum, which will be conducted by the borough council, enables you in the local community to vote on whether you support the Plan or not. If there is a positive vote i.e. at least 50% plus 1 of the votes cast, and it is compatible with EU law, the Plan will then be officially 'made' (adopted) by the council. It will then become part of the statutory Development Plan for Bramley parish and be used to help the council decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area. So watch out for the big vote.

### **Beat Report**

### **Burglaries:**

### **Anti Social Behaviour:**

There have been 6 reports of ASB this month. That is a significant decrease in reported incidents over the last month, and this report also includes Halloween.

I have reports of youths using catapults in and around Bramley. There does not appear to be anywhere specifically targeted, however occurrences seem to gravitate around the areas with close access to the cinder track. If you see any youths with catapults in Bramley please call us on 101 so I am aware of where it is going on. If we get no reports, I do not see a problem and therefore cannot try and fix it.

### **Assault**

There has been a significant increase in assault reports this month, but they have not given me any reason for concern. Most of these assaults have stemmed from the same incident and were recorded for crime data integrity reasons. This means that if we are called to an assault and someone is named as a suspect, naturally we will speak to the suspect. If when we talk to this suspect they counter claim that they have been the victim of assault then two assaults will be recorded even if we will not act on one of the allegations. Likewise, if one person assaults two people, this is not one crime - two occurrences will be created to reflect the two (or more) victims.

water included with dinner. We also provide adapted rooms, equipment as required, return transport from Basingstoke to Heathrow and local transfers and two day trips.

I am therefore looking for physically disabled people who think they would benefit from a supported group holiday in the sun. They are welcome to bring their spouse or friend/family members as their carer/helper or indeed bring their own professional carer.

I am also seeking to recruit a team of fit, healthy, reliable and competent helpers. Fundraisers are also welcome to join.

ICE is unique. There is no other group like this in Hampshire and as far as I am aware, there is only one other similar group operating in Southern England.

# Playing Cricket – **John Stubbs** concludes that **the cricket** is one of nature's goodies Don't upset them though....

Here's a little animal that really seems to have got its PR image well sorted. It won't be as useful as the bumblebee, or as extravagant as the butterfly, but it does seem to have that kind of universal appeal – though when you come to think of it, apart from the colouring, it's not so different from a daddy-longlegs, or even a spider, perish the thought. Anthropomorphism, a really rude word in the trade: it poses as delicately as a ballet dancer, and may sing like a happy choir-boy, so we give it a special status as one of the goodies. This one, a female speckled bush cricket, hopped in the window late in August; in fact they're not uncommon, it's just that normally they're so well camouflaged that they go unnoticed, a trick that didn't work too well on the windowsill.

They're obviously closely related to grasshoppers – the easy distinction being that they have these great long antennae, twice as long as the body - grasshoppers make do with little short ones, so much less elegant. Like all insects, they have an external body casing rather than a skeleton of bones. The snag with this is that when you want to grow, it doesn't stretch – most insects get round this by starting off as a larva, then having a drastic reshape into a finished adult that looks completely different. This is a bit like taking your car in for a service, and getting it back as a small aircraft: a lot of awfully complicated work has to be done, and it takes a fair bit of time. The cricket's approach is different. Rather than having just one major overhaul, it goes through six more modest upgrades: each one looking much like the adult form, but getting bigger and more complex each time, more like your iPhones. These instars even take the opportunity to re-cycle the old bodywork by eating most of it – I guess this hasn't been tried with cars, or phones, however. The advantage appears to be that there's not the long period of downtime: a caterpillar may spend months as a pupa while the changes are underway, and inevitably it's vulnerable to predation or injury during this time, and it consumes energy that had been stored. On the other hand, having to build six new fully-fitted overcoats is quite demanding, and every time one's shed, the little guy is exposed with a soft and delicate skin until it's hardened off. Perhaps growing bones ain't that bad.

Reputed to be chirpy, in the literal as well as figurative sense, the male of this species uses the serrated edges of the otherwise non-functional wings, rubbed together, to communicate: a mating call, an alarm signal, or warning to a rival as appropriate. In the case of the bush cricket, working at around 40kHz, we're not going to hear it – though some crickets can be heard by the human ear. Seems a good enough plan for an insect – but it does have some drawbacks. For a start, some geckos have worked out that if you kidnap a female cricket and hold her singing in a burrow, lots of males will come a'calling. This suits a hungry gecko, but isn't that good for the suitors. Another downer is that some adventitious parasites, on hearing a happy cricket, use the call-sign as a homing beacon for their egg laying – again, not the desired result for the singer.


Apparently crickets used to be kept by the Chinese as portable audio warning devices – when the insect suddenly stopped singing, something or someone was approaching. Territorial males were pitted against each other in miniature cockfights, and crickets were sold just as domestic pets: there's also a market for them deep-fried, it seems. The generally



benign view of the little animals is reflected in many myths and folklore tales – from general good luck on finding one in a dwelling, to their specifically forecasting rain. Pinocchio of course had his *Grillo Parlante*, later re-interpreted as Jiminy Cricket. He was not only very wise, for instance admonishing: "My boy, do not trust those who promise to make you rich overnight. They are usually either mad or charlatans!" He was also totally forgiving, to the extent of his ghost becoming the boy's companion and advisor, despite his former self having been flattened by Pinocchio with a mallet in a fit of pique. Definitely a goody.

### **CORRECTION**

Congratulations to those acute observers who noted that the picture with the last issue's piece actually showed a group of starlings moulting their juvenile plumage. They were, of course, youngsters on their way out to party, just pretending to be fieldfares for a laugh.



### NHS staff have flu jab to stay healthy this winter

Flu is highly contagious, can lead to serious complications for those in high-risk groups and, in extreme cases, can prove fatal. The CCG strongly recommends that everyone gets the flu vaccination especially those in high risk groups including:

- all two, three and four years olds (those born between 1 September 2011 and 31 August 2014)
- pregnant women
- adults aged 65 years and older
- anyone with a long-term health condition
- those in long-stay residential care homes
- carers

You can arrange to have your flu vaccination at your local GP surgery (free for those in the high risk groups) or check to see if your local pharmacist is providing them.
