

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
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
ON REFLECTION

about the following statement? "Britain has changed in recent times beyond recognition; it sometimes feels like a foreign country, and that makes me uncomfortable." Astonishingly, more than half the people in this stable, prosperous, peaceful country agree with that statement.

I spent last weekend at a conference which I'd helped organise, the theme of which was "The Practical and Ethical Challenges of a Changed World Order". A good number of the people attending were from other countries, and it quickly became clear that it isn't just in Britain that there's a strong sense of things being out of control, events starting to overwhelm us: that 'changed order' is making itself felt throughout the western world, and possibly further afield.

What's going on? Well, obviously, that sense of loss of control comes in particular from several events that have taken us completely by surprise, notably the Brexit vote in last year's referendum, or the election of Donald Trump as US President. We think that we know what's going to happen, because we think we have a good handle on the world we live in - so when things turn out completely the other way, we're not only taken by surprise: we're also knocked off balance by the realisation that we obviously didn't understand the way the world works nearly as well as we thought we did. That's a very uncomfortable feeling.

The problem is that all the ways we used to use to understand ourselves and others or to describe where we all stand no longer seem to apply. A number of times in the course of that weekend conference, several speakers referred to a book that has recently been published: "The Road to Somewhere", by David Goodhart. In the book, the author says, "The old distinctions of class and economic interest have not disappeared, but are increasingly overlaid by a larger and looser one – between the people who see the world from Anywhere and the people who see it from Somewhere." And he goes on to say, "Anywheres dominate our culture and society... Such people have portable 'achieved'

identities, based on cultural and career success which makes them generally comfortable and confident with new places and people." They obviously include many people who voted "Remain" in the Referendum.

"Somewheres are more rooted and usually have 'ascribed' identities — Scottish farmer, working class Geordie, Cornish housewife — based on group belonging and particular places, which is why they often find rapid change more unsettling." The Somewheres, being rooted in a particular place, are generally resistant to foreign influence, don't like immigration, and are more likely to have voted in favour of Brexit.

Goodhart's theory, which is very plausible, is that for years the Anywheres - educated, well-travelled, often well-paid, able and willing to move home easily – have been ruling the roost, whether they're on the left or the right. We've all grown used to that. We may not like it much, but at least it's familiar. It was the way things worked. The problem was that the Anywheres in power failed to take account of how the Somewheres were feeling – and the Somewheres were feeling increasingly left behind, unheard, their views and wishes disregarded. That feeling finally boiled over in the Referendum here and in supporting Donald Trump in the US: he at least appeared to hear them and to respond to their longings.

Will the eventual outcome of these choices actually satisfy the desires and aspirations of those who voted for them? Who knows? But perhaps not, because in so many ways those desires and aspirations are so difficult to describe or to act upon.

Someone asked an interesting question at our weekend conference: was Jesus a Somewhere or an Anywhere? On the one hand, except for a period as a refugee in Egypt when He was a baby, He never went far from His birthplace: all of His three year ministry was spent in Palestine. On the other hand, He was entirely at ease with anyone and everyone, from a blind beggar to a rich young ruler, from a Samaritan woman beside a well to a Roman centurion, from a crowd of 10,000 to an individual prostitute. He never threw His weight around, yet He made the most outrageous claims for Himself: "I am the way and the truth and the life; no-one comes to the Father except through me." Or, "I am the Good Shepherd." And again, "I am the Light of the world." Really, I suppose you could say that He was both Somewhere and Anywhere.

What would Jesus have made of our sense of being out of tune with things, uncomfortable, overwhelmed by the unexpected? Well, actually, He addressed that in some of the last things He said to His disciples: "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you... Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world."

We were welcomed by the Project Officer, Flt Lt Elmer, and then guided to the Main Briefing Room where, after a welcome cup of tea, Wg Cdr Bell, Chief of Staff, gave us all an excellent overview of all aspects of the station's operations. He stressed the importance to the station of being part of the surrounding community and explained why it is necessary for them to train in low level and night flying procedures.

Next, personnel from the RAF Regiment Force Protection Training Unit, armament engineers and survival equipment specialists showed us a wide range of weapons and survival

Easter brought children of all ages to Frith Forest Fun Club: what an inventive and adventurous group they were! Every picture tells a story and you can see from the photos how much they enjoyed creating, constructing, testing and sharing their industrious efforts. They made:

- · Rope swings
- · Adventure rope walks

- A complete outdoor gymnasium with punch bag and kick stick
- Magical castles and a Willow tunnel leading to the castle
- Pulleys to transport materials across the mystical magical river
- A shop where they exchanged goods from their "wild craft" mining hunt
- · Mining tools, learning to cut, saw and tie knots
- · Clay creatures of all shapes and sizes!

Many Mad Hatter potions were mixed and our younger clients made some delicious mud pies and leafy cups of tea for us!

Children learned to assess hazards and manage risks for themselves. They discovered the importance of tying secure knots and testing out the ropes to ensure they were tied tightly enough to support weight when someone climbed on. Timber hitches needed to be tied so much higher than anticipated due to the amount of wear they were getting with so many enthusiastic explorers climbing across the ropes to travel through the forest. Probus visit the Museum of Army Flying

"Prince Harry trained to be an Apache helicopter pilot here." John Essery, a Brighton Hill resident who was on Warden Duty, told us the day of our visit to the Museum of Army Flying at Middle Wallop. He had the unusual service record of flying helicopters in the army as a Major and then joined the RAF as a Squadron Leader to continue his helicopter journey.

A chilly day greeted our group of twenty consisting of members of the Probus Club of Basingstoke and several wives to the museum on the edge of this airfield. RAF Middle Wallop opened in 1940 as a Fighter Command Station during the Battle of Britain, then used by the USAAF and returned to the RAF after the war. In 1957 when British Army Aviation became independent of the RAF, Middle Wallop was transferred to the new Army Air Corps. It became the school of Army Aviation, to which it remains to the present day.

Housing over 32 types of aircraft, both early fixed wing and rotary, with an array of support machines and memorabilia, the museum spans nearly 150 years of military flight from kites and balloons almost up to helicopters of the present day.

Probus member retired RAF Squadron Leader Chris Perkins MVO was on hand to talk about the exhibits. We saw WW1 Sopwith Pup, with later Auster and Chipmunk fixed wing and gliders from the D

Day Landings including one that could carry a light tank, then early rotary experiments including a converted Jeep with helicopter additions and an aircraft tail to aid flight, up to missile carrying attack helicopters of recent years. There are also displays of the Victoria Cross holders, various uniforms and changing flying helmets and several field guns. The museum even has a 1940s house with most domestic items bringing back memories to visitors.

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fter the success of the St George's Day Fete in April **Simon Gill**, Chairman of the Trust, explains a bit more about **Clift Meadow** and how the proceeds from the fete will be spent.

The 2017 St George's Day Fete was a great success. If you came I hope you agree and that you and your family and friends had fun; for those who couldn't make it put a note in your diary to come in 2018 - date to follow. It is a rare occasion that we can all find a reason to get together and we are lucky to have such an ideal space as Clift Meadow. There was a great spirit of community and a willingness to be part of something. It was a huge relief for the organisers that so many of you came! Now we have decided to make this an annual event you will be pleased to know that the first planning meeting for 2018 has already happened, but that doesn't mean we aren't open to new faces round the table, far from it, we would be delighted to have fresh input.

Aside from the obvious social benefits of holding a fete it is also an important fund-raising day for Clift Meadow and St James's Church. I wanted to take a bit of your time to explain why fund-raising for Clift Meadow is necessary. So many of you were so generous I thought it was only fair to let you know where your money goes. Clift Meadow compromises the actual meadow including the ball court, tennis courts and car park and the two buildings, the Pavilion and Brocas Hall. The land was bequeathed by the Clift brothers to the Parish Council and the Trustees manage the facility which is registered as a charity, on behalf of the Parish Council. Our



responsibility and aim as Trustees is to provide an environment for members of the village to come together whether this be for leisure or sporting reasons. We are very keen to emphasise that we are not driven by profit but want to make the facilities as accessible as possible to everyone. Ideally, we will maintain a mix of groups that use the facilities whether that is a mothers and toddlers group or a more energetic Pilates class. We have hosted many a children's party as well as wedding receptions, wakes, school discos, quiz nights and Christmas fayres. However, maintaining and running Clift Meadow is costly--- £30,000 a year to be precise. The Parish Council is very supportive but has many calls on its finances and it is right that they should be shared in an egalitarian fashion. It is worth noting that we have been able to maintain an extremely competitive charging rate when compared to other local facilities and that the Trustees

all give of their time freely. The funds from this year's fete will be split between Clift Meadow and St James's but for Clift Meadow we shall see a lot of that go on rather unglamorous expenses such as drains, grass cutting, running repairs as well as insurance, utilities bills, light bulbs and loo paper! If you would like to find out more we have a group "Friends of Clift Meadow" who have made it known that they are willing to be involved in helping at our regular events. We would love to hear from you and welcome you as a 'Friend' (via Facebook or our website), and I hope this explanation has served some purpose. On behalf of the Trustees and me we wish you all a very happy summer and look forward to seeing you at some of our events.

Our new Kits bounded into their lodges with excitement & eager anticipation, as their scouting journey commenced at Beavers!


When asked for just one word to describe


Here is what some of the children (and our art coordinator, Mrs. Britt) have written to tell you a little more about The Priory's involvement.



Claim compensation if your flight is delayed

If you booked a flight that departed from Europe or was with a European airline, you might have rights under EU law if your flight is delayed or cancelled.

For the EU law to apply, you'll need to have departed from the UK, European Union (EU), Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway or Switzerland.

Contact the airline if these don't apply to you - for example, because you flew from New York to Los Angeles, or to Europe on a Qantas plane. What you'll be entitled to will depend on the airline.

If your flight's delayed for 2 or more hours

Your airline have to give you:

- · food and drink
- access to phone calls and emails
- accommodation if you're delayed overnight - and journeys between the airport and the hotel

The airline should give you vouchers to get these things at the airport. Ask someone who works for the airline if you're not offered any help.

If they don't give you help at the airport, keep receipts for expenses and try to claim from the airline later. Airlines only pay for 'reasonable' expenses - you won't get money back for alcohol, expensive meals or luxury hotels.

If your flight's delayed for 3 or more hours

You already have a legal right to food and drink, phone calls and accommodation - you get this when the flight is delayed for 2 hours or more.

You're also entitled to get compensation if the delay is the airline's responsibility - for example, if they didn't get enough bookings or there was a technical fault.

You won't get compensation if it was delayed because of something like bad weather or a strike.

You're entitled to a set amount of compensation depending on:

 the distance of the flight - check the flight distance on the WebFlyer website

- the length of the delay how late you are getting to your destination
- whether you're flying to an EU or non-EU destination

You have to claim from the airline to get compensation. Search their website or call their customer services department

If your flight's delayed for 5 hours or more

You don't have to take the flight if it's delayed for 5 hours or more. It doesn't matter whose responsibility the delay is.

If you don't take the flight

The airline legally has to give you all of the following:

- · a full refund for the flight
- a full refund for other flights from the airline that you won't use in the same booking, eg an onward or return flight
- if you're part-way through a journey, a flight back to the airport you originally departed from
- · food and drink
- · access to phone calls and emails
- accommodation if you're delayed overnight, as well as journeys between the airport and the hotel

Talk to someone from the airline as soon as you decide you don't want to take the flight.

If you do take the flight

You can claim up to €600 in compensation if the delay is the airline's responsibility - depending on the distance and destination of your flight. It might have been your airline's fault if there was a technical flight, or they overbooked.

You won't get compensation if it was delayed because of something like bad weather or a strike.

Cancelling a holiday

Your rights to cancel a holiday (or a particular part of a holiday like a flight or a hotel booking) usually depend on the terms and conditions of your booking, and your reason for wanting to cancel.

You might be entitled to cancel the holiday without a cancellation fee if the holiday company changes the holiday or puts the price up after you book.

Check your travel insurance

You might be covered for cancelling a trip if you have travel insurance - check your policy or contact the insurance company if you're not

If you've changed your mind or can't go

If you've changed your mind about a holiday or you can't go anymore (eg because of an emergency), you should check the terms and conditions of your booking to see what your options are. It's likely that you'll either have to pay a cancellation fee or won't be entitled to any refund at all. Contact the company if you can't find your terms and conditions.

If a holiday company changes the holiday after you book it

You have the legal right to cancel without charge if the company has made 'major changes' to the holiday after you booked it. There's no exact definition for what a major change is.

If the price of your holiday increases after you book

You have the legal right to get a refund or book a different holiday if the company makes a 'major increase' to the price of the holiday.

There's no exact definition for what a major increase is - the Association of British Travel Agents suggests that 10% or more is a 'major increase'. However, this is only a guide.

f, like me, you are one of the many people who blame **grey squirrels** for everything that goes wrong in the garden then prepare to be re-educated by **John Stubbs**

I wonder if it's just a matter of being, sort of, out of fashion. OK, perhaps our greys are not quite as cute as the reds - seeing red squirrels in our nearest colony on Brownsea Island is well worth the trip - but, let's face it, we're not going to get them round here. It's unfair, though, to blame the grey squirrels for this, notwithstanding the impressive array of calumnies arraigned agin them. Couldn't it be also a case of 'give a dog a bad name', as in tree rat? If we had no greys, would we then get a healthy population of reds in our trees?

In fact, it seems very unlikely. Red squirrels are much more suited to large areas of coniferous woodland: the deciduous and mixed woods round here, mostly small and increasingly fragmented, are OK for the more flexible, robust grey. For the pickier red, not so good. Greys are happy to subsist on acorns – green or mature - reds only like acorns when they're green. They need lots and lots of pine kernels, all the year round. Warmer, urban zones greys can hack, reds just don't thrive there.

Then there's the vexed question of squirrelpox virus: didn't the imported greys bring this killer disease to ravage their native cousins? In fact it's not at all clear that they made all that much difference. This disease, one of a number of variant strains that affect other small animals, was around in the UK before greys were introduced. Both red and grey can survive it, the main problem being the fact that with conditions more generally in favour of the greys, they're stronger and build immunity fairly quickly. The more marginal reds don't have the stamina to fight it: they succumb sooner and the consequent high viral loads make them very infectious to their communities. Particularly where they gather to use well-intentioned feeding stations, cross infection from saliva and faeces is a real problem.

As a means of limiting disease, local culling of grey squirrels is, of course, usually a total nonsense. These guys are very mobile, and if conditions are right, they'll soon take over any spare nest sites and food resources. The effect then is that there'll be a lot more young greys out there exploring – spreading disease rather than reducing it.

Yes, of course grey squirrels strip the bark from trees, and they'll take some bird nests. So do the reds – if possibly on a rather smaller scale due to being the smaller animal. The bark damage, though, is rarely fatal to the tree – usually at worst causing discolouration of the wood or loss of a branch. This is naturally unpopular where the timber is of cosmetic value - but the resultant increased insect populations are a bonus for birdlife. Neither squirrel is much of a threat to overall bird numbers; they really don't hunt, they're just opportunistic.

As with so many such problems, it's a waste of resources trying to support the unsustainable. The first priority has to be reducing both habitat loss and environmental degradation: animal populations will sooner or later adjust, for better or worse. There have been some spectacular species reintroductions, but it's a process much too easy to get wrong. For this reason I can't see that the proposal to introduce pine martins could work as a control – though they do apparently prefer to chase grey squirrels rather than red, this could well change if they got hungrier. As might the local cat population.



The young animal in the photo I met a few times sprinting across the gravestones at the back of St James's. The squirrel sprinting, that is, rather than me – though I did have to be awful quick to get a shot of him. One very neat trick that these nimble fellows have is that they can rotate their hind legs so that the claws point forwards. This gives them four-wheel-drive: they can go both up and down trees maintaining full traction. A cat, on the other paw, is lightning on the way up, but rubbish at getting down, using a sort of clumsy reverse scrabbling technique that younger ones sometimes find just too daunting to attempt.

Habitat is everything.

PS: Return of the Ducks

If you remember last July's magazine piece, we had then hosted a brood of mallard ducklings in one of our flowerbeds. She returned to precisely the same spot this year – they hatched on the 14th April and a day later they marched in line straight over the road, heading towards Bow Brook. Quite brave, really, but they all made it.



My Summer Holiday Application Was Refused! What Are My Options?

Annual leave requests come thick and fast for employers over the summer months. Balancing the needs of the company and those of employees who have to deal with childcare arrangements over the school holidays can be challenging. So what are your rights if you need time off?

Gill Brown, Head of the Employment Team at Phillips Solicitors has the answers.

Can your employer refuse your holiday request?

The simple answer to that is yes it can. Every employee is entitled to a minimum of their statutory holiday of 28 days inclusive of the eight bank/public holidays if they work on a five day per week basis – pro rata for different working patterns. Contrary to the general belief there is no statutory right to actually have any bank/public holidays off work although this is often contractual. Employers are actually entitled to designate when holiday has to be taken.

For example, it is legal for a company to have a shutdown period when holiday must be taken or to designate a busy period when no holiday may be taken at all. Many companies only grant holiday requests on a first come first served basis to ensure cover in every department. If you are refused holiday for one of these reasons you need to check what the provisions are in your contract of employment and check that the company has a clear and transparent holiday usage policy, which it is operating fairly and without discrimination. Simply granting time off on a grace and favour basis is not an acceptable way for an employer to behave.

What other rights might you have for taking time off for childcare in the summer holiday?

Dependant leave – You are entitled to take unpaid dependant leave to deal with emergencies relating to your dependants. This usually means for a maximum of one or two days and would cover the emergency of regular childcare arrangements failing and you needing time to sort out alternative arrangements.

Flexible Working — Whilst the company is not obliged to grant your request, it will be obliged to seriously consider any application that you make formally for flexible working. Traditionally this is to reduce hours or days, but there is nothing to prohibit an application not to work during all or part of the school holidays. Remember, however, that any flexible working request that is approved is permanent (unless agreed otherwise) and you can only make one request in any period of 12 months whether it is refused or granted.

Parental Leave — After one year of employment you are entitled to apply for up to 18 weeks unpaid leave to spend with each of your children before they reach 18. No more than four weeks unpaid parental leave can be taken in any calendar year. The employer can reject the dates proposed and offer alternatives, but cannot completely refuse the request.

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
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
