



#### **ON REFLECTION**

im writing this column the day after the House of Commons voted overwhelmingly against the Prime Minister's Chequers deal for leaving the EU. All the pundits, not to mention most MPs, said that her proposal was going to be rejected by a colossal majority. Not surprisingly, it was. The big question, really, is what happens now?

I sincerely hope that you who are reading this know the answer to that question by the time this edition of the *Bramley Magazine* pops through your front door. Maybe all the fuzziness will have cleared away and you now know how it's all going to work out. But I doubt it.

What we do know is that our whole country feels as if we're adrift in a rowing boat on the high seas, without any oars, any compass or indeed, any clue about where we ought to be going, even if we had the means to propel ourselves in that direction. What makes matters worse is that it feels as if everyone in the rowing boat is angry with everyone else. We see ordinary people on our TV screens shouting abuse at each other, waving Union Jacks or blue flags with EU stars on them and trying to bash each other with the flagpoles. Our famous British moderation, our willingness to listen to the other side – sceptically but respectfully - seems to have got lost in the process. It all feels as if that W.B. Yeats quote is steadily coming into its own:

"Things fall apart; the centre cannot hold

Mere anarchy is loosed upon the world."

The journalist Simon Kuper, in a recent FT Weekend article, wrote: "It's now quite likely that Brexit won't happen. The Commons is expected to vote down Theresa May's withdrawal agreement

with the EU, several times if necessary...
Meanwhile hundreds of MPs are
manoeuvring to prevent a no-deal Brexit.
So Britain may remain, perhaps after a
second referendum."

Kuper continues: "Abandoning Brexit scares even Remainers like me. Leavers will say the elite has ignored 'the will of the people'... There could be political violence (death threats to MPs have become common), a revival of the UK Independence Party, and American levels of polarisation. Every problem the UK faced afterwards would be blamed on the betrayal of Brexit." [My italics.]

What a gloomy prospect! The thought of a future filled with people endlessly blaming one another, whether Leavers or Remainers, about the referendum result, the fruitless Parliamentary processes of the last two years, the obstinacy of the EU, the everlasting and incomprehensible Irish backstop, the Chequers deal and the politicians... can the human frame stand it? And if not, what on earth are we to do about it?

Last night, there was a most extraordinary moment out in Parliament Square where all the demonstrators were massed in their tribal groupings. When the result of the vote was announced, the Brexiteer group with their Union Jacks all cheered loudly, beaming and smiling and clapping each other on the back. *But so did the Remainers!* And so did all the other groups, Welsh and Scottish and Northern Irish contingents, Communists and Anarchists and a group of Japanese

tourists who'd taken the wrong turning out of their hotel. Everyone was cheering and laughing and celebrating even though they were still on totally different sides, wanting totally different things, and now, after this vote, arguably had even less chance of seeing their wishes fulfilled. Extraordinary. I'd love to have been able to ask them, Why are you celebrating? What happens now?

Simon Kuper in his article suggested: "Remainers ought to model themselves on the ultimate healing politician, Nelson Mandela. He treated everyone with what his comrade Walter Sisulu called 'ordinary respect' – always standing up, for instance, when a tea lady entered the room. Respect helped melt his opponents... He knew they would never vote for him. But because they felt he heard them, they handed him their country."

Well, I'm all for a bit more respect between people of opposing views, and I quite agree that Nelson Mandela is a great example of a man who didn't bear a grudge against those who had treated him appallingly over the years.

But when it comes to "ultimate healing" there is surely only one human being who ever really merited that title. He's the one who gave sight to the blind, cleansed lepers, enabled paraplegics to walk, brought corpses to life. He's the one who asked God to forgive the soldiers who were hammering nails into His hands to pin Him on a cross. What would He say to us as we look around and wonder, "What happens now?"

Well, we know what He said to His followers the night before He died: "I have told you these things so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." If we build our hopes for peace of mind and heart on Britain Leaving or Remaining, if we expect magic solutions to appear out of thin air now that Chequers has bitten the dust, we will be disappointed. As one of my favourite modern hymns declares, "In Christ alone my hope is found." I'm banking on Him. He has my vote.

#### **Bramley Poppy Project 2018**

In this magazine one year ago, I asked for support to create a poppy waterfall for the rood screen at St. James Church Bramley to mark the centenary of the end of WWI. I asked for 1,000 knitted or crocheted poppies in the hope that we might get 2,000. Needles and hooks set a-clicking and poppies soon started to arrive. Children knitted a few rows of poppies on Clift Meadow at the St. George's Fete, whilst non-knitters there offered financial contributions towards costs. From the visually impaired lady in the village who knitted two amazing poppies, to the WI and knitting groups in the village who produced them in their hundreds, all were gratefully received. One ex-Bramley resident sent some from South Africa, some were knitted whilst on holiday in America, some from Wales and as news spread more and more people contacted me wanting to contribute. So, 4,000 poppies later (!!!), a small team spent three weeks sewing them into place. The final display was stunning and many people viewed it at the Remembrance Day Service and in the three weeks following. It was greatly admired by all.

I know I said my thanks at the tea party held for all involved but I would just like to say another huge THANK YOU for everyone's efforts no matter how great or small; to the sponsors, including one local small business who sponsored all the hanging materials; to the British Legion and the church for their agreement and encouragement to embark upon this venture and, last of all, to Dusty Taylor for helping me to co-ordinate knitters. A bonus was being able to donate over £80 to the British Legion Poppy Appeal from monies donated to the project.

I am so very proud to have been a part of this project. I know many others have expressed their delight at being involved, too, and also to be able to do something as a community. What a wonderful way to honour those who fought and died for us all those years ago!

#### News from Bramley Village Hall

During the last week of January, the Village Hall supported the national initiative to celebrate the role of village halls in local communities, Village Halls Week (22-28 January). The campaign was supported by Action Hampshire and the ACRE network of rural development charities. In particular, the campaign wanted to show how village halls help to tackle social isolation, giving people a local venue for activities from lunch clubs and support groups to exercise classes and film shows. We have a large number of users of the Village Hall in Bramley, with a variety of groups with diverse age ranges and activities. Some of the organisers of those groups provided helpful feedback on the role of the Village Hall in their activities which we shared with Action Hampshire and we've published some of their comments on the Bramley Village Hall website.

Planning for the refurbishment and extension of the Village Hall is moving forwards and we are now at the tender stage. We are keen that local companies should be involved in this project and if you know of any building companies who might be interested, please encourage them to get in touch with me at Chairman@bvht.org.uk We remain optimistic that we will be able to complete this project by the autumn; this is an ambitious timescale and we have already discovered some issues with the existing building (largely a 1960s/1970s construction) which may add to our costs. We remain keen to minimise disruption to our users and to maintain the normal range of activities at the Hall. I'll keep you posted as plans and the timescale mature; we will also post details on the Village Hall website.

Finally, a big thank you to all those who came to the November Mistletoe Fayre and helped support the Village Hall as well as the host of talented, local artisan producers exhibiting there. This year's event raised invaluable funds of nearly £800 which will be used to ensure our hall continues to function efficiently and successfully. We hope to repeat the event again in 2019 so please get in touch if you are interested in taking a stall.

#### Sayings and Groundhogs

By the time you read this, Christmas and New Year will be just a distant memory. But the Christmas period often stirs memories of Christmases past. At the festive season we often see family members and conversations turn to memories of growing up. Very often old family traditions are discussed and old family savings are remembered. Here are just a few that I remember, and which surfaced again this year.

Family Christmases are not always harmonious. Arguments begin, tempers are raised, and then perhaps an awkward silence descends. At moments like these, my mother would often come out with a saying that, I assume, must have been borrowed from a film or play. It was a kind of ice breaker: 'Do you think the bicycle will ever become popular?' she would intone in a gentle voice. This was generally taken as a signal for everyone to move on and peace and harmony were then restored.

On Christmas day, as my father carved the huge turkey (suitable for a family with five children) he would perform an impression of his grandfather. My great grandfather was someone I never knew - he would have been born in the mid-Victorian era and my father's memories would be from the 1920s when he was a boy. So the impression I have is of some Dickensian figure, admiring the feast and exclaiming 'Beautiful bird! Beautiful, beautiful!' This happened every Christmas without fail.

As I reached adulthood and spent my first Christmases away from my family, with my future in-laws, I became aware that all families have odd sayings. I found myself in the kitchen one day amidst the normal Christmas mayhem.

My father-in-law approached and said 'Let the monkey see the dustcart!' which turned out to mean 'Please move out of the way, I'm doing something important'.

Christmases with the in-laws were a rich vein of sayings. Any change of clothing, for example putting a coat on to go out, would always be preceded by 'I'm just going to slip on a banana skin'. Presumably 'slipping on your jacket or overcoat' was too mundane. I think this might have orginated from an early Goon Show. For younger readers, this was a popular comedy programme on the radio.

When the time came to leave the house of a relative, someone would always say something like 'Keep waving, it's good for the business!' I have no idea about the origins of this one.

My own family were not really alcohol drinkers. However a bottle of white wine would normally be present on the table for Christmas, and in my teens I was permitted a glass. One year whilst being served some sprouts, one escaped and landed in my wine. For ever after, I was always asked 'Would you like a sprout with that?

And now looking forward to 2 February, I would just like to remind you all that this is Groundhog Day. If the groundhog sees its own shadow as it emerges from its hole there will be six more weeks of winter. If it is cloudy then Spring is nearly here. Any small creature or even a teddy bear can perform the ceremony however. Last year I mentioned this, and in my garden my cat could see her own shadow. The 'Beast from the East' duly followed and we were still seeing snow into March. Just saving...

#### A Mouse Less Timorous by John Stubbs

I caught a shot of this little fellow despite all his natural instincts. Definitely not expected to win awards for conspicuous bravery, a field mouse lives or dies by its very inconspicuity: being seen is failure – over millions of years, selection has honed its skills of disappearance. This doesn't imply a lack of moral fibre: you need to do what you're good at, if you live on your own down there. That means planning escape routes whenever out feeding, digging burrows, keeping to tunnel routes and of course having the sharpest hearing and sense of smell of all small mammals. What predator wouldn't want to snap up such a handy snack – dog, cat, fox, weasel, owl: and they don't ask first.

So, how come that apparently lazy, well fed housecat can very often present its owner with a mousey prize? To a mouse, of course, pusscat won't present the same sort of leisurely demeanour as the warm furry bundle by the fireside: in many ways, our pets could give lessons to Hydes and Jekylls on character fluidity. But there could be a bit more to it than just a two-way predator/prey competition. Cat and mouse, plus something extra that's rather odd. The oddity's name in this case is something of a mouthful, in more ways than one: toxoplasma gondii. This creature is an invisibly small parasite that has, again over literally millions of years, set up home in the gut of cats - any old cat, big or small, and though it can survive happily in most mammals, it can only reproduce egg-wise in a feline. It has what passes as a fairly normal life-style for a parasite in that it exits its host animal in large numbers, hangs around outside for a while, then one way or another contrives to get back to multiply inside another unsuspecting host of the right sort. How it does this, and the possible side effects, are just a bit weird, though.

If our little mouse pictured above is healthy and fully *compos mentis*, mouse-wise, it will be scared witless by cat-wee: the least whiff will launch flight mode. This is a hard-wired response that's not lost even after tens of thousands of lab bred generations. It's part of the basic brain circuitry laid down that handles fear and arousal – not the later, more social sorts of behaviours. But if mouse, rat or similar is infected by *T. gondii*, then hey, that's an awful nice perfume I smell round here, let's sniff some more.

This, then, is how the parasite completes its cycle - lots of parasites have to hang around waiting to be swallowed or get a lift with a mozzie: this guy gets the temporary host, like a mouse, to volunteer to be eaten by the main host, a cat. Back home catside, eggs are produced, to be spread around the locality in cat faeces. How neat is that? Well, depends on your point of view, I guess.

So, live and let live, then. After all, cats are really not much affected by their extra residents: mice and suchlike locally may have a reduced life expectancy, but their numbers are limited as much by habitat conditions as predation, and they rarely complain. The very fact, though, that the parasite can cross the barrier into the brain of a mammal is a bit alarming: not many things can pull this trick – normally bacteria and the like are rigorously excluded, even drugs and antibodies are stopped. And once in the brain, there can be



effects other than just a different choice of perfume. Prey species show changes in temperament, making some more aggressive, some less inhibited. And unfortunately we are, historically, a cat prey species. So, infected humans can be in the same boat, as it were, and the number of people infected is in fact quite high, though infection directly from cats is pretty rare.

Several other parasites use pretty devious ways to further their ends, of course. There's a fairly common fluke that gets an infected ant to climb to the top of a blade of grass and wait for a browsing animal to ingest them — an ant's brain, however, is not well secured against hackers. Other parasites will make a host clumsy or otherwise vulnerable through sickness; effective but not in the same league as *T. gondii*. If there was a prize for sheer Machiavellian ingenuity, this little bug could be a winner.

#### Author's Note:

Machiavelli was a fifteenth century politician with an unfortunate reputation for duplicity and the denial of morality, justice, truth, and wisdom. Obviously he'd have no parallel in present-day world politics, so I couldn't use a more modern example.

#### **Probus hears about NATO**

NATO (the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation) was founded in 1948 and enlarged in 1949 to a total of 12 countries bordering the North Atlantic. The criterion of NATO membership is that any armed attack on any member country in Europe and North America would constitute an attack on them all.

Member countries assign assets in the form of military hardware and personnel to NATO and are managed in all operational roles by NATO staff.

Probus member and Basingstoke Borough Councillor Paul Miller outlined his personal involvement in this international defence structure over four decades. As an officer in the RAF and latterly as a civilian, he rose within NATO eventually being based at their headquarters in Belgium.

Today the membership has grown to 29 countries. Many newer members of NATO were originally eastern bloc countries that formed the basis of the Warsaw Pact organisation set up by Russia.

The Balkans crisis started in 1989 and included the Bosnian and Kosovo campaigns. These were only as successful as they were due to the cooperation of the former communist countries of the Czech Republic, Poland and Hungary who allowed their airfields to be used by NATO forces, hoping it might help with their subsequent applications to join the EC.

NATO air forces needed to have surveillance and operational access to this airspace despite tourist planes still flying. It eventually ran an air campaign over 78 days involving 38,000 sorties which allowed in a multinational peacekeeping force which brought an end to ethnic cleansing.

Today NATO has become a Crisis Management organisation as its forces continue to lead the way in Kosovo, Afghanistan, the Mediterranean and several other places including Iraq, where it is carrying out training of national forces. NATO is carrying out work on the European migrant crisis and has 20,000 troops in action around Europe and elsewhere.

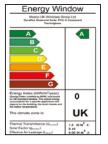
