

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remember, Christmas has been something to be celebrated in song and verse. You can't read John Betjeman's poem, *Christmas*, without immediately getting a flavour of St James's Church in Bramley passing through your mind:

"The holly in the windy hedge
And round the Manor House the yew
Will soon be stripped to deck the ledge,
The altar, font and arch and pew,
So that the villagers can say
'The church looks nice' on Christmas Day."

And then there are all those songs we start to hear in the supermarket, which, however much you may resent the idea of Christmas starting in mid-November, do get us humming along and the words come popping into our heads unbidden.

"It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas;

Soon the bells will start – And the thing that will make them ring is the carol that you sing Right within your heart."

Well, more accurately, the words that come popping into my head are something like, "It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas,... dum de dum dum dum." And that tends to be true for quite a few of the popular Christmas songs that float through the air wherever we go.

"Chestnuts roasting on an open fire; Jack Frost nippin' at your nose. Dum diddle dum diddle dum diddle dum... Merry Christmas, everyone."

Or that great song of Paul McCartney's "The mood is high... the spirit's up, Dum dum de dum... dum dum de dum, Simply having a wonderful Christmas time!"

Music by Paul McCartney, lyrics by David Cameron, I suppose.

But most of all, of course, the songs that really make the bells ring are the carols that we sing, not just within our hearts, but in the church, carols that many of us have been singing for years and years and years. We all have our

favourites; I rather enjoy singing "God rest you merry, Gentlemen," which always conjures up images of a group of Nigel Farages standing round the bar, beer mugs in hand, singing "Merry Christmas, everyone!" But actually, the well-placed comma in that title line shows that it's not the Gentlemen who are merry, but rather the wish that God would "rest them merry", in other words, encourage and reassure them with the Gospel's message of comfort and joy.

"God rest you merry, Gentlemen, Let nothing you dismay; For Jesus Christ our Saviour Was born on Christmas Day; To save us all from Satan's power When we had gone astray, O, tidings of comfort and joy, comfort and joy,

O, tidings of comfort and joy!"

My all-time favourite carol is actually a modern one written by Graham Kendrick, "Thorns in the straw". My lovely wife has sometimes sung it as a solo at our Carol Service, and I find the way that she sings its melody and the words heart-stoppingly beautiful. The song imagines Mary glimpsing the bitter-sweet story of her new-born Son, as she finds a thorn in the manger straw that cradles her baby's head. It weaves the sorrow of Good Friday and the celebration of Easter into the joyfulness of Christmas, which is what makes it such a powerful account of the Christian message.

"Just a blanket on the floor Of a vacant cattle-stall, But there the child was born, She held him in her arms.

And as she laid him down to sleep
She wondered - will it always be
So bitter and so sweet?

And did she see there
In the straw by his head a thorn?
And did she smell myrrh
In the air on that starry night?
And did she hear angels sing
Not so far away?
Till at last the sun rose blood-red
In the morning sky..."

Great words; a thought-provoking image for Christmas.

Well, as I will say in the church at the end of our Christmas Eve service, let me say to you and your family, "May the joy of the angels, the eagerness of the shepherds, the perseverance of the wise men, the obedience of Joseph and Mary, and the peace of the Christ child be yours this Christmas!"

# Bramley Community Speedwatch is working for a Safer Neighbourhood. One of its members, Paul Holland, asks: what speed is too fast?

You may have seen recently a new Speed Indicator Device being deployed in Bramley. Bramley Community Speedwatch, with a grant from Bramley Parish Council and donations from County Councillor Rhydian Vaughan and ex Borough Councillor Venetia Rowland, has now been able to deploy its Speed Indicator Device (SID) around the village starting outside the Village Hall on The Street. The first deployment was for six days during the middle of October and the results from the data captured were quite staggering. Almost 48,000 vehicles passed the SID during its deployment with an average of 50% of those vehicles exceeding the 30mph speed limit.

A speed of **78 mph** was recorded during this initial deployment!

The data that has been collected from the SID shows that The Street in Bramley suffers from a significant issue of vehicles driving in excess of the 30mph limit throughout the day. The information that is collected is being provided to the Police and other agencies with a view to looking at how to reduce the excessive speeding.

Utilising the data collected from the Speed Indication Device (SID) will allow the Bramley Community Speedwatch team to identify days, times and locations where Speedwatch may be fully deployed to capture details of vehicles that are exceeding the speed limits and help bring the levels of speeding down in an effort to make our community a safer and more pleasant place to live. The details of any offences are forwarded to Hampshire Police and entered onto the Police database. Initially the registered owner of the vehicle will be provided with a written warning



letter. If the same registration number is logged again within 12 months the owner will receive a further warning or a visit from the Police. If they are logged a third time the details will be looked at for further action.

Commercial vehicles or vehicles that belong to companies will have a separate letter sent to their transport manager and the roads policing unit will be made aware.

## How can you help? We are always looking for additional volunteers

#### Who can volunteer?

Volunteers must be aged at least 17 and will need to complete an application form and a vetting process which can take up to six weeks to clear.

Specialist training will be given to volunteers and volunteers working on the roadside will be given high visibility jackets, wet weather equipment, road side signs and equipment to monitor speed and record vehicle details. Volunteers will be covered under Hampshire Constabulary's public liability insurance for roadside working.

Deployments only last for 1 hour and are looking to be held every 3-4 weeks around the village. By having more volunteers, the frequency and duration of deployments can be increased.

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Conversations with a purpose

#### A 1944 Christmas Story

You may be aware that this year is the 75th anniversary of the D-Day landings. You will not be aware of another 75th anniversary approaching at Christmas time. Who is the handsome young RAF Flight Sergeant in the picture, and why is he clutching pineapples and bananas? All will be revealed.

To begin at the beginning: the young man is my late father-in-law, Derrick Woodgate. He joined the RAF as soon as he was able in 1942 and served mainly in 206 Squadron Coastal Command. The planes flown by 206 Squadron were American B-17 Flying Fortresses. They were less suitable for bombing missions than the famous Lancaster, but ideal

for bombing missions than the famous Lancaster, but idea for the work of reconnaissance over the Atlantic, which included gathering meteorological information for the Allied forces and anti-submarine warfare.

During the latter part of 1942, shipping losses (sunk by U-boats) were averaging 500,000 tons per month in the Atlantic. Vital supplies to the UK were being lost. A suitable Atlantic base was needed away from the UK to extend the range of the B-17s to allow them to neutralise the U-boat threat. By January 1943 there were 37 U-boats operating in the mid-Atlantic Gap.

Portugal was and still is our oldest ally, under a treaty signed in 1373: incidentally the oldest treaty still in existence in the world. Portugal was neutral in World War 2, and permission was granted for an RAF base in the Portuguese Azores, at Lagens. That is how Derrick Woodgate found himself in the Azores for much of 1943 and 1944.

This was not as comfortable a billet as it might appear. For most of the time tents were the only accommodation: four officers, eight NCOs or twelve other ranks to a tent.

Field kitchens provided food. But there were compensations. There was no black-out as there was back home and the local town had restaurants with wines and spirits freely available. There were also pineapples and bananas, unknown at home since the start of the war.

Back home, Derrick's mother, Dorothy Woodgate, was worried about her son and occasional letters, subject to military censorship, did little to allay her fears. In the weeks before Christmas she had a dream that her son Derrick had been killed. Out in the Azores, Derrick had been granted home leave for Christmas.

Shopping opportunities were limited but Derrick and the rest of the crew knew what they would be taking home as Christmas gifts: pineapples and bananas.

It was Christmas Eve when Derrick knocked on the door of the house in West Norwood in South London. His mother answered. She was not expecting to see her son, and she had not seen a banana or a pineapple since 1939. Her fevered brain did the only thing it could, when unable to take in the vision on the doorstep. She fainted and had to be revived. Of course, it was a joyful Christmas after that. Not all of the fruit was consumed, and just after Christmas there was a knock on the front door. A reporter and photographer from the local paper had heard the news of the only bananas and pineapples in West Norwood and wanted to interview the young flight sergeant, who was having his first lie-in for months. He pulled on his uniform over his pyjamas and went downstairs where he posed for the photo that you see. Merry Christmas everyone! And give thanks for the bananas and pineapples you now take for granted.

#### Do you need a lift to the surgery?

If you do, Bramley Volunteer Drivers will take you there, in return for an agreed donation. We are a group of Bramley residents who are willing to drive those who are unable to drive themselves. We can take you to Clift Surgery, Basingstoke Hospital, your dentist and other health related appointments in the Basingstoke area. By arrangement, we can also go to other hospitals in the region, such as Southampton General.

How does it work? Easy. Ring this number: 07787 166924. Our co-ordinator will ring you back and arrange to visit you and make a risk assessment. Once you've been accepted onto our books the process is simple. Leave a message on the answerphone with details of the date, time and place of your appointment. A volunteer will ring you back to confirm, and then ring round the pool of drivers (around 20 of us) to find someone who can take you there. The volunteer will then ring you again to confirm.

What is an agreed donation? We suggest £3.00 to the Clift Surgery, £6.00 to Basingstoke Hospital, £15.00 to the Royal Berkshire Hospital in Reading (plus parking). The money goes to pay for the petrol; our time is free of charge.

Is this official? All the drivers have been vetted by the Disclosure and Barring Service as being suitable to work with vulnerable adults. Bramley Volunteer Drivers is part of the Good Neighbours Support Service (GNSS), which is itself supported by the Church of England, and funded by local Council and NHS Clinical Commissioning Groups.

Any more questions? Ring 07787 166924 and leave your name and number. A volunteer will ring back. We're a friendly bunch and eager to help if we can!

Anyone who has visited the Village Hall recently will have noticed some major changes to the front of the building. 




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

## DON'T BE A DNA! CAN'T KEEP IT? CANCEL IT!

A DNA is a patient who Did Not Attend an appointment at the surgery and failed to inform us.

Would it surprise you to learn that more than 15 million general practice appointments are being wasted each year because patients do not turn up and fail to warn their surgeries that they are unable to attend? Last month alone the Clift Surgery had a DNA score of 68 missed appointments.

There are around 307 million sessions scheduled with GPs, nurses, therapists and other practice staff every year and 5% - one in twenty – are missed because there hasn't been enough notice to invite other patients. That works out as around 15.4 million missed slots.

Of these, around 7.2 million are with busy family doctors, which adds up to more than 1.2 million GP hours wasted each year – the equivalent of over 600 GPs working full time.

Each appointment costs an average of £30, putting the total cost to the NHS at more than £216 million pounds, on top of the disruption for staff and fellow patients.

It is hoped that the introduction of the Primary Care Networks will improve access to GPs and other health professionals. These Networks are increasing recruitment of practice staff and making appointments available in the evening and at weekends right across the country. on general practice increase and with this in mind we are asking patients more than ever to cancel their appointment in good time if they cannot keep it. Our practice offers SMS reminders to encourage our patients to keep their appointments or cancel them in a timely manner.

#### St. Stephen: Forgotten Martyr?

Waking up on the feast of St. Stephen (Boxing Day) is usually a pleasurable experience; the 1977 Soul lyric, "(Easy) Like Sunday Morning" can appear in the mind. Christmas Day usually involves some kind of stationary position indoors but on St. Stephen's Day we are venturing towards a new calendar year and new resolutions: "I must go out for a run or a walk". The light of the fridge early on St. Stephen's Day reveals the lure of a cold turkey sandwich for breakfast and although your hand automatically moves to your mobile, you have time to think, do I really want to see pictures of people I know and some cases I don't recall from the day before? A cup of tea and the bedclothes invite you back and there is still a possibility of 30 minutes or so before the rest of the human beings in your dwelling wake up.

But what do we really know about St. Stephen? Well, Stephen was the first Christian martyr and was publicly stoned for his faith. Accused of blasphemy at his trial, Stephen made a long speech denouncing the Jewish authorities who were sitting in judgement on him. Stephen's martyrdom was witnessed by Saul of Tarsus, a Pharisee, who would later become a follower of Jesus: Paul the Apostle. The Catholic, Anglican, Lutheran, Oriental Orthodox, Easter Orthodox Churches and the Church of the East venerate Stephen as a saint. Traditionally in paintings and depictions, St. Stephen is invested with a crown of martyrdom, three stones and the martyr's palm frond. St. Stephen's patronage ranges from altar servers and cabinet makers to horses, Serbia and the relief of headaches?!

The Church in Little London is named after St. Stephen. If you haven't been there why not come along for the carol service on Sunday 15 December at 5pm. Interestingly, there are other places and parishes which carry the name Little London, both in the United Kingdom and abroad. Some are even adjacent to other places called Bramley.

St. Stephen's Tower in London is iconic. Most people know it as Big Ben but that is the name of the bell inside, not the tower. Recently the tower has also been given the name the Elizabeth Tower after our current monarch.

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# aking Light Work. At a time when environmental protests are frequently making the news, it's good to have a thoughtful piece on the subject from John Stubbs

When John Constable painted his well-known view of a cart, a couple of hundred years back now, he was showing the transport technology of the time: the best way of getting an essential supply of energy to where it was needed. It wasn't stuck in that (presumably flat) ford – the driver would have been soaking the wooden wheels so that the swelling firmed up the joints, while the nags had a drink. The same sort of thing would have been seen around here, and, of course, it makes a nice scene; the embellishment of a billion biscuit tins.

Now, it is just possible that the shot above may never get chosen for a fridge magnet or a box of chocs, but to me it shows a lot of advantages over the old hay-wain. It's the photovoltaic (PV) panels in Little London, and more of them can be seen along the Aldermaston Road. OK, I guess they aren't things of great beauty. But they can make an immediate and very positive contribution to easing the burden society makes on our sadly damaged natural resources.

Planting trees? Yeh, a very good thing to do, and it will show a benefit in twenty years' time - provided the irrigation, the drainage, the pruning, the weed-clearance, the fertilising, the disease prevention, the tree species choice, the animal damage, the finance, the land maintenance, and one or two further problems are addressed, long-term. Growing bio-oil feedstock, or ethanol from wheat? Same as the previous, without the twenty-year problem, but plus an allowance for pesticides, harvesting, transport, fermentation, processing, waste disposal, and blending.

Wind power can be the cheapest of the renewable energy supplies – but it needs large scale and the right siting to be most effective, and usually that's not where the power demand is. Nuclear fission? Probably no one ever actually said it would be too cheap to meter – and for the steady base-load supply it was effective. But factor in the building and dismantling costs, fuelling, maintenance and



unquantifiable insurance costs with the long-term storage of radioactive waste, it ain't cheap and is far from carbon-neutral. Even hydro-electric generation has been shown to produce more carbon than gas fired, if the wider environmental effects are included. No reasonably sound carbon-reduction methods should be outlawed – but of course there are plusses and minuses for all of them.

The big plus points for solar PV lie in the improving economics (subsidies aside), their passivity, and the independence of the sites from international politics. In many cases the electricity can be used locally, reducing transmission losses and the load on the grid. The carbon output is around one-sixth that of gas-generated electric power. They are quiet, relatively unobtrusive and should generate for a generation. However, though the efficiency of the cells has greatly increased, and the price of the panels is now a tenth what it was fifteen years back, the set-up costs will be high, and a fair number of planning and environmental hurdles have to be met. There are maintenance costs, and reverting to farmland must be possible. The land used may allow some plant growth, but there'll be a lot of shading and obstruction making cultivation or animal husbandry difficult. The

electricity output will be very variable - and energy storage is still expensive, though getting easier.

This is literally catching sunbeams. In the Bramley and Little London of Constable's time the process would have been to grow crops, and most of the village would have been involved in getting sustenance to the table planting, harvesting, carting, milling, baking, feeding livestock: long hours of hard work with no guarantee of the yield. Either way it's grabbing the sun's energy, but instead of pitchforking hav to the horses, we can run a house or a car, and cut out the middle-animal. The best land can still be used for farming, with less need for heavily fertiliser and pesticide treated industrial crops such as oil-seed rape.

Sending a ginormous tanker to the Middle East and buying millions of barrels of that sticky black stuff, or piping in gas to burn, is bound to be more than a little fraught – and yet it's something that we subsidise: the UK still gives more to fossil fuel industries than to renewables. Fixing your pension on the value of these buried toxins? The sooner we get to leave fossil fuels where they won't harm us, the better. Fewer wars, less climate overheat, less pollution and happier, cooler reindeer.

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

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
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
